

Colleton County celebrates 300 years

Dana Cheney showed off his muscular calves Saturday morning along with friends David Willard Jr. and James Burns. The men -- dressed in calf-bearing breeches, waistcoats and tricorne hats -- fired black powder rifles and joined about a dozen other reenactors on Colleton County Museum's front lawn to

demonstrate tools and trades of the 1700s as a part of Colleton County's 300th Anniversary Celebration.

The celebration kicked off Friday with a proclamation by Gov. Mark Sanford from the balcony of the Colleton County Court House in Walterboro and will continue today and for the rest of the year throughout the county.

Cheney, a 15-year Revolutionary War re-enactor, is full of fun facts about the time period.

"A lot of expressions we use today come from the 1700s," he said. Such as: Keep your powder dry and don't go half cocked, derived from gun powder and rifle use, he said. Another expression, put your best foot forward, comes from dancing. "A lady would curtsey and a man would put his best foot — usually his right foot — forward to show off his calf muscle."

Cheney's wife, Bonita, was seated nearby churning butter while a group of 10- and 11-year-olds from St. Jude's Episcopal Church watched and tasted butter on pieces of bread (it was a tad too cold for the butter to harden, so butter made Tuesday was served).

The group of kids, sporting tricorne hats and red breeches, played Yankee Doodle on fifes throughout the day between wandering and asking too many questions of demonstrators, who also included a primitive fire maker and anthropologist, Russell Cutts and his girlfriend, Christina Gordon, who explained the art of brain tanning, or how to tan a hide using animal brains and a quart of warm water.

Budd Price, president of the Colleton County Historical and Preservation Society, key organizer of the yearlong celebration, said the anniversary will focus on St. Bartholomew's Parish near Jacksonboro, which established Colleton County in 1706.

Also, from Aug. 31 to Sept. 3, the Battle of Parkers Ferry, won by Gen. Francis Marion's troops, will be reenacted, and the historical society has plans to reopen the nearly forgotten George Washington Trail, which traces President George Washington's overnight stay in May 1791 in Colleton County.

"We want to develop a sense of history in the place that we are sitting in," Price said. "And to develop tourism and pride where we live."



The Colleton County Telephone Co. some days ago completed a separate line-between the stores of Colleton Mercantile and Manufacturing Company in town and Ritters. Messre Sanders and Lemacks now have long distance connection at Ritters. If is the intention of the Telephone Company to extend the line that they bave at Ritter on to Green Pond at an early day. A splendid line has been constructed from Walterboro to Hendersonville and the people in this thrying town will have connection to Walterboro and throughout the country by Saturday night of this week. The line to Getsinger and throughout that section of country will be completed at an early day. And it is the intention also in the next month or two to extend the line to Sandy Dam, Mr Henry Stokes in the Providence neighborhood, Colson's mill, at the old burnt kiln, and other points up the railroad towards Smoaks and Ehrhardt. The Company now has installed about 125 phones.

Following General James Oglethorpe's initial settling of Europeans from England, Scotland, and the Palatine to the Georgia Colony and the dissolution of the Georgia trustees' charter, the British Crown offered substantial land grants to entice other colonists to settle and work the Georgia countryside.

As early as 1752, colonists from New England, Virginia, and the Carolinas poured into Georgia, bringing with them their families, servants, and sometimes entire religious communities. By 1775, these "frontier" settlements had established extensive coastal cotton and rice plantations. After the Revolution, Patriot veterans established homesteads by taking up land grants for their war services.

During the early 1800s, Georgia employed a series of land lotteries to attract even more settlers. Once the federal government had evicted Georgia's Cherokee and Creek populations during the late 1820s, the stage was set for a climactic state lottery of middle and western Georgia lands in 1832.

Her three-volume THE GEORGIA FRONTIER is nothing less than the culmination of a career spent tracing Georgia families.
